The Restorative Justice process used by the Town of Arlington to address the matter regarding Lieutenant Rick Pedrini has now come to a conclusion. This process provided the best opportunity for our community to heal from the divisive, irresponsible, and unacceptable comments that he published in a law enforcement journal last year.

The Town chose to engage Lt. Pedrini in a process known as Restorative Justice, which focuses on the rehabilitation of responsible parties through deep engagement and reconciliation with victims and members of the community. The process was conducted by the Town in partnership with the non-profit Communities for Restorative Justice.

As part of the process, Officer Pedrini participated in a series of meetings over many hours with representatives of the immigrant community, Mystic Valley NAACP, religious community and law enforcement community, as well as municipal officials and Town Meeting Members. In all, he heard comments from more than 100 members of the community in person and in writing.

Lt. Pedrini, who was placed on administrative leave following the publication of his offending comments, will be allowed to return to work having met the expectations of the Restorative Justice process, including demonstrating remorse. As part of his restorative agreement he will be required to undertake a number of additional restorative steps, including a written public apology, and be subjected to certain punitive actions (which cannot be disclosed publicly for legally mandated reasons of employee privacy). He will return to work under the supervision of Acting Police Chief Juliann Flaherty, who will be responsible for enforcing the terms of Lt. Pedrini's return.

Lt. Pedrini was offered the Restorative Justice process because he expressed remorse for, and acknowledged the harm created by, his comments, and because those comments did not reflect his record and performance as a police officer. It is important to note that the traditional labor arbitration and litigation process is inherently uncertain and presents little opportunity for community healing.

Through the Restorative Justice process the Town was able to guide an outcome and promote a therapeutic dialogue.

The Town of Arlington has no tolerance for the type of employee behavior exhibited by Lt. Pedrini, which is at odds with the progressive programs and policies championed by the Town and Police Department. We believe that this innovative approach to addressing the matter is just, expressive of our abhorrence of such behavior, and useful in advancing the goals of respectfulness and inclusion in our civic life. We are grateful for the support and guidance provided during the process by Communities for Restorative Justice as well as the dedicated community members who brought tremendous perspective and wisdom to the process.

The Town's coddling of racist policing and its suppression of dissenting voices is despicable. I will never again view the Town Manager as anything but an autocratic racist. The philosophy behind Restorative Justice is one of communities holding each other to account OUTSIDE of the criminal justice system and its actors. This is a venerable old practice used by oppressed and marginalized groups. They are the very peoples who understandably do not trust police and who are the recipients of endemic police brutality. - including one death every 18 hours at the hands of U.S. police, and monstrous dis-proportionality in our prisons. The history of U.S. policing is one of slave catchers. That is how it evolved. Fact, not my opinion. With the assistance of white 'reformists' the very meaning Restorative Justice has been perverted by the massive criminal justice system, and misused to protect police and state violence. In addition it is now commonly employed by police as a 'bargaining chip', much as pre-trial detention and plea bargaining is. In other words, cops may 'offer' 'restorative justice' to someone who should not be charged at all. If the person offered 'R.J' declines, there will be consequences. In this manner, like most other 'reforms', restorative justice is "weaponized" as another tool in law enforcement's huge arsenal. And as we've witnessed now in this monstrous injustice that coddled a cop's public calls for violence against the very people for whom true restorative justice was intended, corrupted restorative justice is serving to protect law enforcement. I have been doing this work for 25 years; the depth of denial vis a vis the Town's racism is remarkable. We don't/won't see it because it's the 'air' we 'breathe'.) Hello Whitney --- to answer your query, information about how the Town is protecting a police officer, Lt. Pedrini , who used his position in a police newsletter to advocate violence against Blacks, BLM, 'immigrants', Indigenous people, the homeless, and drug users is available on line. The Town is suing a fake "Restorative Justice process to let him off the hook.

This failure to protect community and minimization of brutally violent statements fit well within Arlington's 'progressive, middle class racism & classism. It is top down, from Town manager Adam Chapdelaine, the Select Board, the Human Rights Commission and apparently Senator Cindy Friedman. (See the link below.) **The ARB is facilitating and embracing gentrification** that will insure that only middle class whites can live here. ARB may claim to be open to democratic participation, but their actions and officious demeanor show otherwise. To add insult to injury, tenants are encouraged to speak in favor, write positive LTEs, etc. **It's all of a piece- the future of Arlington will be whiter than white and economically comfortable!**

nd fyi: Pam Hallett, HCA Director lied in public again at last Monday's ARB meeting when she spoke about no need for on street parking. Despite many corrections she's received she continues to claim, for example, that there are 32 parking spaces in the Capitol Square Complex (252-260 Mass Ave. There are 23 and she has been made aware of that. She ought to know as her office is in the Capitol Square complex. This is the figure she and the MAPC continue to use as a reason to have fewer parking spaces in future multiple unit housing, despite both MAPC and HCA being corrected. Here is a woman who treats tenants miserably and whose buildings are poorly maintained.

I will speak about this tonight at the Select Board meeting when the warrant for over night parking comes up. Pam Hallett is a deeply dishonest landlord who views tenants as commodities. So does the ARB. If you (plural) continue to allow her to make false statements at public meetings there will be push-back.

I am one of many HCA renters who has just gotten a \$304. monthly increase, from \$1,205. to \$1509., which is the Boston area HUD Maximum for a one bedroom apartment. Buckling floors, poor ventilation, heat that is most always below the state minimum, dust, no ground cover, rude management. Soon only voucher holders will be able to live in 'affordable housing' in Arlington and we all know folks are waiting years to get a voucher.

THIS IS POVERTY-PIMPING.

CHAPA is working hand-in-glove with ARB to suppress the voices of tenants.

Adam: I didn't want to call you over the weekend because I know that you (and my friend Dan) are under an enormous amount of stress. Unfortunately for Dan, I was in constant touch with him.

Friday night, I got a text message from Naomi G. about the meeting on Thursday night. I talked to her on Saturday, and talked to Cindy F. about it all because Dave Swanson had called her at 11 o'clock on Thursday night because he was upset. These two are very green, and haven't been faced with the confrontational tactics that they saw on Thursday from the group. Yesterday, I meet with three more Commissioners and listened to them as well.

My takeaway from all of this is that the Commission was surprised by this "assault" and that they didn't have the procedures in place to handle it. Sharon Grossman, who is a veteran member of the group, wasn't at the meeting but has since drafted up the procedure for public input for them for their next meeting. On Saturday, both chairs wanted to quit. I think because of Sharon's, Cindy's and others attention that will not happen. We don't need this to blow up right now.

Cindy wanted to come to our meeting tonight. Dan told me that she isn't on the agenda so how could she speak? She will call you instead.

All the Commissioners that I talked to did feel as though they were not really asked to participate in the circle, they were told by you and Christine that they had to do so. This may or may not be true. With more experienced chairs, they might have changed that but they were upset that you were disappointed with them when they didn't participate in the circle.

The rant of the Thursday crowd was all about the police force, as I believe you know from all the FOI requests in the last week or so. One of the demonstrators is a college professor who brought his entire class to the HRC to show them a meeting and to tell the Commission that the Town was doing the restorative justice work wrong.

Also, the same group is coming to us tonight to talk about the parking article. Dan has put them first because of a request from the lead person to go early because she is disabled. I am not sure how we are going to drift from parking into police but I am sure we will hear the same stuff. Naomi had texted Julie F. on Thursday and the police were outside but didn't come into the HRC meeting. I talked to Julie yesterday as she was about to walk her dogs on the beach at [REDACTED]. She told me that none of the group has had an interaction with the police department. When the group first appeared in front of the BOS, I did call Pam Hallett of AHC about them. She said that the AHC had bent over backwards to accommodate them but they are never happy. If we do go forward with the resolution for Town Meeting, I would like Doug to please strike the phrase about the evil landlords and real estate agents because there are two sides to the story. As you know, Pam is a town meeting member.

Julie is willing to have two officers in civilian dress sit on Mass Avenue tonight, but that decision is

up to you. If they behave as they did Thursday, we might need them because we have a very long agenda and will be there until midnight if they don't leave the chambers. I will leave the decision to you. Diane and I think it might be prudent. Marie doesn't want it. Of course, Dan doesn't think we need them either. I haven't reached Joe or John yet. In my experience, it is often helpful to have some police nearby. We needed some police at some of the Mass Avenue meetings.

The good news is that Campaign meeting last night with all the field workers (about 60 young, "new" faces) was great. Jane Morgan and Kate Leary are firmly in charge of the troops and the messaging and it was reassuring. The three bald guys, Len, Dan and Dean Carmen are the leaders and they spoke well last night.

Also, Mary O is in Ireland this week. Have you talked to Bobby yet? Dan is still mad, as he should be, about the missteps with the recent assessments. But we need to solve this problem.

Clarissa who has one meeting and 12 days left, and by the way, still no paycheck.

Adam - at the risk of over stepping my boundaries I thought that I'd write this note rather than chiming in on the public feedback inbox.

I have no doubt that Rick is a decent human being and there is no evidence that I'm aware of that his practice of policing mirrored his writings.

That said, I have a couple of very serious concerns.

1) Rick's MPA work has become a distraction to his duties at APD and the culture of the MPA is not reflective of the culture of the Town of Arlington nor the APD. That is not likely to change anytime in our lifetime. The last time I attended one of their meetings they gave a standing ovation in response to an announcement of a fatal police shooting. As an element of any credible restorative contract I think that he needs to step away from the MPA.

2) As I understand it, Rick recently attended a Patrol Officer union event and accepted some sort of "best supervisor" award. If this is true, the fact that a lieutenant, who is out on admin leave pending discipline, chose to attend and accept an award from the APPA is VERY concerning on a number of fronts. Symbolically, this is a snub in the nose to the TM, his management team, the restorative process, and to the community as a whole. Further, the fact that the APPA created this award and gave it to Rick is evidence of the harm that his actions have caused to the culture and credibility of the APD.

Failure to address these issues will have a long-term adverse impact on the credibility of the APD.

Dear Ms. Flaherty,

As a long-time Arlington resident I have generally viewed examples of police racism, bullying and abuse of force as a "somewhere else" phenomenon, deplorable but not a local concern. The Arlington police officers with whom I have interacted have been polite and helpful, and reports of police interactions with the Arlington public generally have been positive. I thought the police were good people and on our side. Community policing at it's best was to be found in Arlington.

This incident involving writings by Lt. Pedrini served as a reminder that there are individuals, probably in most police departments, that embrace an "us verses them" mentality that implicitly justifies abusive behavior toward civilians. These people are questionable not only for what they might do if they feel provoked or threatened, but also as "bad apples" that can poison the thinking of their colleagues. When it is apparent that somebody holds these views it is dangerous to give them authority under arms.

The idea that explaining to Lt. Pedrini that his thinking is wrong-minded and against department policy is going to produce real changes in his mindset is laughable. He is too likely to be entrenched in his ways to profit from well-minded attempts at rehabilitation. As a citizen, the idea that I might seek help from the police and then have to deal with an armed thug is highly worrisome.

I understand that it is much easier to slide the Lieutenant back into your system with a slap on the wrist than to terminate him, but to take the easier path in this case is to seriously erode the trust of the community in the Town's and the Police department's values. You and the Town Manager and the Select board should understand that trust is built very slowly but can be lost in a second.
